

Dear Quincy University community:

This message is the twenty-fifth update on Quincy University's response to the COVID-19 pandemic. If you are a member of the QU community and have not read the previous update messages, we encourage you to search them out in your email folders or read them at <https://www.quincy.edu/coronavirus/>. The QU coronavirus website also includes a link to our Q&A document, which was most recently updated on Friday, March 27.

**Reminder:** Registration for QU summer and fall classes opened this week. You can always contact academic advisors and success coaches for help with registration. Students should be aware that only an academic advisor can open the registration portal.

Two COVID-19 cases have been confirmed so far in the Quincy region. To the best of our knowledge, neither is connected to QU.

As many news sources indicate, we are still seeing a steady increase in the number of such cases reported in Illinois, in Missouri, across the nation, and around the world. There are now 7,695 COVID-19 cases in Illinois, with the great majority of those cases in the Chicago area. We remind everyone that no part of our nation is likely to avoid COVID-19 cases. There currently are 1,834 COVID-19 cases in Missouri.

**As announced two days ago, Illinois, including Quincy, is now operating under a “stay at home” order until the end of the day on Thursday, April 30.**

Quincy University's residence halls and cafeteria remain open and will remain open for the semester, while QU students will take courses exclusively online for the remainder of the spring semester. As announced previously, QU's spring commencement ceremony has been postponed to a later date.

At QU, Facilities has continued its enhanced daily cleaning protocols using the best CDC practices for sanitizing areas, with a focus on commonly touched areas. In addition, Facilities has completed detailed cleaning and sanitizing of the air systems in QU buildings to improve the overall health and safety of the occupants. New air filters are installed after the cleaning and sanitizing process is completed.

Tomorrow, current Quincy University students will receive a handout by email that provides important advice on how to be successful in online courses. My thanks to Dr. Reed for having this handout prepared. And, as a tip, we suggest that you never challenge Dr. Reed to a *Lord of the Rings* trivia competition.

Thank you to all the QU students who have filled out the student survey sent to you today and to those who will be doing so very soon. We will be reading each response and we will be addressing as many concerns as we can and doing so quickly. Please look for an email from Dr.

Tracy on Friday to address the questions about summer, moving out, tutoring, and supplemental instruction. We appreciate your time spent completing this survey, and it will help us more fully address your concerns and needs.

If you were planning to graduate this spring, but are now planning to complete a ninth undergraduate semester or fifth year at QU, please be sure to speak with your academic advisor about whether or not it would be beneficial to add an additional major or minor to your degree plan to ensure maximum eligibility for federal and state financial aid. Federal awarding rules require financial aid dollars to be used to fund college courses that are required for degree completion. Once you have met degree requirements, federal eligibility is reduced.
